EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Program

- 1. The investment program supports the Ulaanbaatar city master plan in upgrading priority services and developing economic hubs (sub centers) in *ger* areas. The anticipated program impact is improved living conditions in Ulaanbaatar; its outcome is a network of livable, competitive and inclusive sub centers in Ulaanbaatar *ger* areas.
- 2. The program will be implemented in three tranches expected to be implemented over a 9-year period. The total cost of the Program estimated at \$320 million will be financed by the Asian Development Bank (ADB), the Urban Environmental Infrastructure Fund (UEIF), the European Investment Bank (EIB) and the Government of Mongolia. The ADB financing will be provided through a multitranche financing facility (MFF) consisting of a mix of ADB resources including the Asian Development Fund (ADF), ordinary capital resources (OCR) and ADB-administered UEIF funds. The closing date of the ADB loans and ADB-administered UEIF grant for the Tranche 1 originally scheduled on 30 June 2018 is expected to be extended to 31 December 2019.1
- 3. The program tranche 1 will develop priority infrastructures, facilities and capacity building in the Selbe and Bayankhoshuu sub enters. The Tranche 1 components are those anticipated at Appraisal with some minor changes: (i) sewerage network extension; (ii) roads and urban services; (iii) social and economic facilities; (iv) multi-interventions in the Ulaanbaatar Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (USUG); and (v) institutional and capacity building.

Implementation Status – Implementation Arrangements

4. As of 30 June 2017, the Tranche 1 is about 26.61% complete as shown in the table below. The Tranche implementation is about six months behind the schedule anticipated at Appraisal. Delays are mainly due to (i) lengthy process in ratifying the multitranche financing facility (MFF), signing and making effective the loan and grant agreements, recruiting the consultants; (ii) design adjustment required to meet the existing conditions of the Project areas; and (iii) lengthy design process. The construction activities under Tranche 1 are scheduled to be completed by mid-2019.

The ADB mid-term review Mission of February 2017 recommended a 1.5-year extension of the ADB Tranche 1 loans and UEIF grant.

Without considering the actual progress of PMO establishment and PMO staff training, the actual progress of the project is 18.86% as of 30 June 2017.

- 5. As envisaged at Appraisal the Ulaanbaatar Municipality (MUB) is the executing agency (EA) for the Program. The program implementation is under the MUB Project and Cooperation Unit (PCU) in charge of infrastructures and *ger* areas development and headed by the Ulaanbaatar Deputy Governor.
- 6. The program management office (PMO) responsible for the daily administration of the program is under the PCU. The changes in the municipal administration resulted in the replacement of some PMO officers, which to a limited extent affected the PMO business

process. As of 30 June 2017, the PMO is currently staffed with 15 well qualified and experienced officers.

7. Following an MUB's decision² the procurement activities have been transferred from PMO to the MUB Procurement Agency in December 2016.

Procurement Plan - Procurement Status

- 8. The original procurement plan consisting of 16 contract packages³ under ADB financing and two packages to be financed by the European Investment Bank (EIB). Originally, all packages were to be procured through international competitive bidding (ICB). The procurement plan has been revised to meet changes in the Mongolian procurement regulations and as a result of adjustments to the detailed design of the Program infrastructures and facilities.
- 9. Based on the latest updated procurement plan₄ the construction of the infrastructure and facilities will be implemented through 25 procurement packages including 14 ADB-financed packages and 11 EIB-financed packages. The consulting services (CS) will be provided through five consulting firm contracts and two individual consultant (IC) contracts.₅
- 10. **ADB-financed Construction Packages** Of the 10 OCR-funded contract packages, seven are under bidding (five ICB and two NCB packages) with contract award expected in the third (Q3) and fourth (Q4) quarter of 2017; the detailed design and bidding documents for the remaining three packages are being finalized. Of the three ADF-funded packages, one is under NCB bidding with contract award expected in November 2017. Bidding documents are being finalized for the remaining two packages.
- 11. UEIF-Financed Package The design, supply and installation of pump equipment, SCADA system, rehabilitation and commissioning of the pumping stations and water and wastewater treatment plant is financed through the UEIF funds; the \$3.37 million turnkey contract has been awarded on 13 October 2016. The detailed design by the contractor has been completed and works are about 40% complete.
- 12. **EIB-financed Packages** All 11 EIB-financed contact packages including ten construction packages and one good package will be procured through NCB. Three contract packages for the construction of sewerage collectors in Bayankhoshuu and Selbe sub centers have been awarded in March and July 2016 for a total amount of \$3.62 million. Of the remaining seven construction packages for a total estimated cost of \$19.3 million, one is being tendered and bidding documents are being finalized for the other five; the contract awards are expected in Q4 2017. The EIB-financed goods package for the procurement of water supply and sewerage pipes for an estimated amount of \$1.83 million is under bidding; contract award is expected in early 2018.
- 13. Consulting Services Packages The implementation of the Program Tranche 1 is supported by five team of consultants. All consulting services are being 100% financed from the ADB ADF Loan.

CS1/CSDD – Detailed design and construction supervision. The \$4.02 million CS1 contract was signed on 29 May 2015 with the joint venture (JV) Dohwa

The updated procurement plan yet to be approved by ADB is attached to the memorandum of understanding (MOU) of the ADB mid-term review Mission of February 2017.

Individual consultants were recruited at the start of Tranche 1 to facilitate the program start-up. As of 30 June 2017 all IC contracts have been completed.

Engineering Co. Ltd. (Korea) and Korea District Heating Corporation (Korea) in association with Monconsult LLC (Mongolia). The detailed design of the infrastructure and facility was completed in the end of April 2017. Delivery of detailed design has been significantly delayed even though partly due to reasons behind the control of the consultants. The Consultant still hasn't delivered the budget estimation to the PMO hindering the PMO to produce more or less accurate forecast of disbursements.

CS2/CSPM – Program Management Support. The \$1.24 million CS2 contract was awarded to Egis International on 5 June 2014. Of the four contract variations processed one increase the contract price up to \$1,32 million as the result of increase in consultants' inputs. During the second quarter 2017 CS2 activities focused on expediting and monitoring procurement of the program contract packages. Also, several training sessions were conducted on bid opening, bid evaluation, archiving and personal skills. Workshops on land acquisition and involuntary resettlement as well as the ADB Safeguard Policy Statement were organized.

CS3/CSCE – Community Engagement and Small and Medium Enterprise (SME) Development. UN Habitat provides consulting services through a \$699,936 contract signed on 25 June 2015. The consultants continued with consultation meetings to disseminate the program concept and facilitate the understanding and support of the program beneficiaries; and further develop and implement the SME development plan.

CS4/CSSD – Improved Urban Planning and Sub center Development. The consulting services are being provided by IPE Global & Associates through a \$799,990 contract signed on 13 August 2015. The work during Q2 2017 focused mainly on (i) the preparation of the local development plans (LDP) for Bayankhoshuu and Selbe sub centers; (ii) the development of a block planning manual and related tasks; and (iii) the assessment of training needs and the design of a training program in sub center redevelopment for key agencies of government.

CS5/CSOI – Improved Operations and Management of Service Providers and Institutional and Regulatory Reform. The consulting services to support utilities providers toward improved operations and management are yet to be contracted. PMO is preparing the request for proposal to be submitted to ADB along with the shortlist of consultants.

Safeguard Components

1. Land Acquisition and Resettlement

- 14. Meeting the Tranche 1 requirements related to land acquisition and resettlement (LAR) requires the preparation and updating of five resettlement plans (RP):
 - (i) RP1 –Selbe and Bayankhoshuu sub centers heating plant, kindergarten, business incubator and training center;
 - (ii) RP2 Bayankhoshuu sub center roads and infrastructures;
 - (iii) RP3 Selbe sub center roads and infrastructures.
 - (iv) RP4 KTMS-Tasgany Ovoo-Tavan Shar Water supply network; and
 - (v) RP5 Bayankhoshuu sub center water reservoir and pipes.
- 15. Of these five RPs three are to be fully developed because the proposed works were not anticipated at Appraisal and two (RP4 and RP5) have to be significantly amended and expanded due to the increased scope of roads and infrastructures in the final approved detailed design. In addition to the RPs two due diligence reports would be required one for

Selbe/Dambadarjaa water reservoir and pipes and the other for Bayankhoshuu heating pipes and facilities for replacing existing pipes with new ones with more capacity.

- 16. As of 30 June 2017, the RP1 is being finalized and expected to be completed by the end of August 2017: RP2 and RP3 are expected to be completed by the end of September 2017; and the RP4 and RP5 are being prepared. The due diligence report for the piping and water reservoirs in Selbe and Dambadarjaa is being prepared and expected to be completed by the end of August 2017. The due diligence report for the heating piping works and facilities in Bayankhoshuu sub center is expected to be completed by the end of August 2017.
- 17. Based on preliminary figures the number of affected households (AHH) is significantly higher than anticipated at Appraisal. This is mainly due to the change in the road layout, widening of the project roads and the laying of pipes outside the right of way of the existing roads. As of 30 June 2017, the anticipated number of AHHs stood at 824 of which 379 fully affected and 454 partly affected.
- 18. The overall cost of the LAR is tentatively estimated at about \$23.54 million well above the Appraisal estimate of \$1.02 million. More figures that are accurate will be determined once the negotiations with the affected households are completed, agreements reached, and RPs finalized.

2. Environment

- 19. The environmental assessment and review framework (EARF) and the environmental management plan (EMP) have been finalized according to ADB requirements. The updated EARF and EMP have been posted on the ADB website. A public consultation was conducted to inform likely affected households of the potential environmental impacts of the 25.2 mWt heating station.
- 20. The second Environmental Monitoring report covering the June 2016-June 2017 period was prepared and will be submitted to ADB by mid July 2017. The report referred more in detail on the occupational safeguard issues related to the sewage collector line subproject in Selbe and Bayankhoshuu sub centers.

3. Social and Gender

21. A database has been developed at macro and micro level for the two sub centers based on the existing secondary data by sex disaggregated. The consultants updated the database to incorporate secondary data from the National Statistics Office and Department of Ulaanbaatar Statistics. To date, 121 community consultations and training sessions were conducted and attended by 3,137 persons, of whom 55.7% were women. Workshops were conducted on ADB and Mongolian Government's Safeguard Policies and Principles with regards to Social Safeguards for stakeholders from government officers of Songinokhairkhan, Chingeltei and Sukhbaatar districts.

Tranche – Investment Cost-Financing Financing – Disbursements

- 22. At Appraisal, the Tranche 1 was estimated \$104.52 million. Based on the actual price of the awarded contracts and updated cost estimate of the to-be-awarded contracts the total project cost has been updated at \$106.14 million, 1.6% above the appraisal estimate. The cost increase mainly results from higher than estimated land acquisition costs.
- 23. The Tranche 1 is financed through three sources: the ADB, EIB and the Municipality of Ulaanbaatar. The ADB's funds are provided through a loan from the Asian Development

Fund (ADF, SDR14,54 million), a loan from the ordinary capital resources (OCR, \$27.50 million) and a grant from the Urban Environmental Infrastructure Fund (UEIF, 3.70 million). As of end of June 2017, the updated financing reveals the following changes: (i) the ADB ADF Loan amount in dollars terms is reduced from \$22.50 million at Appraisal to about \$20.50 million due to the depreciation of the US dollar against the special drawing rights (SDR); (ii) as the result of the increased land acquisition cost the contribution of the MUB significantly increase from \$22.44 million at Appraisal to about \$32.43 million by the end of June 2017; and (iii) the less than anticipated costs of the water supply and sewerage works reduced the EIB financing share.

24. As of 30 June 2017, all ADB loans and grant combined the total disbursement stood at about \$7.44 million, mainly for consulting services under the ADF Loan; the current ADB and EIB low disbursement ratio (14.38% and 9.49% respectively) are likely to pick up with the signing of several civil works contracts in the last quarter 2017.

Covenants

25. Most of the loan covenants due by end of June 2017 have been complied with. The 2016 audited financial statements were submitted to ADB on 31 June 2017. No significant deviance from road map and policy framework has been recorded.

Conclusions – Issues – Recommendations

- 26. With a completion rate of about 18.86% (26.61%) and an overall disbursement ratio of about 12.15% the implementation of Tranche 1 is behind schedule. The anticipated target date for completion by mid 2018 is unlikely to be met. The finalization of the LARPs and the delayed and lengthy procurement processes significantly contribute to the implementation delay.
- 27. While the decision to have the procurement activities handled by the MUB Procurement Agency acting as an independent procurement agent is in line with good governance principles, the need to have the evaluation and recommendations for contract award reviewed by PMO prior to seeking ADB concurrence on the bid evaluation report delays the process. In many instances during the quarter under review, the evaluation of bids was to be reconsidered at the request of the PMO Procurement Committee. Furthermore, the MUB Procurement Agency also dealing with other MUB procurement activities may not have sufficient resources to handle the large number of Tranche 1 contract packages, which are to be awarded in the next six months. The same apply to PMO procurement unit while reviewing and amending the bid evaluation reports and eventually incorporating the ADB's comments.
- 28. As a prerequisite to the start-up of the civil works, five LARPs have to be finalized and implemented. Of these five, three have to be fully developed and two significantly revised to reflect increases in land acquisition as a result of significant design changes. While the LARP preparation is well advanced, there is a risk for their implementation to be delayed: (i) negotiations with the affected people may take lon*ger* than anticipated and (ii) due to the significant increase in the land acquisition costs there is a risk of shortage of MUB funds to acquire the land required before the 2018 construction season.
- 29. To address the procurement issue there would be a need to reinforce the staff resources of both the MUB Procurement Agency and PMO. In addition, the CS2 procurement consultants should strengthen their support to PMO and maintain close relation with ADB to anticipate the issues and take remedial actions. While capacity is not an issue, there is still a need for CS2 to provide training through training sessions and on-the-job guidance.

- 30. Concurrently with expediting the procurement activities there is a need to finalize the five LARPs and expedite their implementation including negotiations with the affected land and property. There is a need to closely monitor land acquisition cost given the MUB financial constraints.
- 31. Also, the Tranche 1 investment costs have to be closely monitored. Upon signing contract under ADB OCR financing it will be necessary to breakdown the contract price to identify costs pertaining to heat distribution networks from the other costs items. This exercise is required since the financing percentage are different for these two categories, 55.00% and 69.60% of the total expenditure claimed for the heat distribution networks and other works respectively.6

Α. The Program

- The investment program supports the Ulaanbaatar city master plan in upgrading priority services and developing economic hubs (sub centers) in ger areas. It is geographically targeted with multisector interventions. Responding to the urgent demand for basic urban services and the ongoing densification, the program is implemented through an integrated approach to initiate a redevelopment process in ger areas and develop urban sub centers as catalysts for growth.
- 33. The anticipated program impact is improved living conditions in Ulaanbaatar. Its outcome is a network of livable, competitive and inclusive sub centers in Ulaanbaatar ger areas. The updated status of the program design and monitoring framework (DMF) is attached as Appendix 1.
- The program will be implemented in three tranches, which are anticipated to deliver the following four outputs: (i) expanding roads and urban services within priority sub centers and improving connectivity between them; (ii) improving economic and public services in targeted areas; (ii) improving efficiency of services providers; and (iv) strengthening institutions and capacity for urban development, program management and service delivery.
- At Appraisal, the Program was expected to be implemented over a 9-year period 35. ending in December 2022. The total cost of the Program estimated at \$320 million will be financed by the Asian Development Bank (ADB), the Urban Environmental Infrastructure Fund (UEIF), the European Investment Bank (EIB) and the Government of Mongolia. The ADB financing will be provided through a multitranche financing facility (MFF) consisting of a mix of ADB resources including the Asian Development Fund (ADF), ordinary capital resources (OCR) and ADB-administered UEIF funds.
- The closing date of the ADB loans and ADB-administered UEIF grant for the Tranche 1 originally scheduled on 30 June 2018 are expected to be extended to 31 December 2019.7

В. Tranche 1 - Program Scope

37. The program tranche 1 will develop priority infrastructures, facilities and capacity building in the Selbe and Bayankhoshuu sub enters. The Tranche 1 components are those anticipated at Appraisal: (i) sewerage network extension; (ii) roads and urban services; (iii) social and economic facilities; (iv) multi-interventions in the Ulaanbaatar Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (USUG); and (v) institutional and capacity building. However as a result of the detailed design four minor changes in scope were introduced in the ADB-financed

The ADB mid-term review Mission of February 2017 recommended a 1.5-year extension of the ADB Tranche 1 loans and UEIF grant.

- (i) Power substations were added to the original installation of power cables to meet the actual power supply needs; a separate construction package covering power supply and telecommunications has been added to the procurement plan;
- (ii) Due to the recent capacity increase in the central heating system implemented by the Municipality of Ulaanbaatar (MUB) the decentralized heating plant originally envisaged to cover Bayankhoshuu sub center is no lon*ger* required; the provision of heat to this sub center will be through a connection to the heating network complemented by a booster station and two substations;
- (iii) In anticipation of the upcoming Ulaanbaatar Affordable Housing and Urban Renewal Project, at the request of MUB an affordable housing pilot project to be implemented in Selbe sub center was added to Tranche 1 scope; and
- (iv) As a result of the savings under the EIB-financed construction packages, the flood protections and drainage works were removed from the ADB financing and transferred to the EIB financing.

C. Implementation Status

38. As of 30 June 2017, the Tranche 1 is about 18.86% (26.61%) complete (**Appendix 2**). The Tranche implementation is about six months behind the schedule anticipated at Appraisal. Delays are mainly due to (i) lengthy process in ratifying the multitranche financing facility (MFF), signing and making effective the loan and grant agreements, recruiting the consultants; (ii) design adjustment required to meet the existing conditions of the program areas; and (iii) lengthy design process. The construction activities under Tranche 1 are scheduled to be completed by mid 2019 (**Appendix3**).

D. Implementation Arrangements

- 39. As envisaged at Appraisal the Ulaanbaatar Municipality (MUB) is the executing agency (EA) for the Program. Further to the change of municipal government in July 2016, the program implementation shifted from the Urban Development and Investment Office to the MUB Project and Cooperation Unit (PCU) which is headed by the Ulaanbaatar Deputy Governor in charge of infrastructures and *ger* areas development.
- 40. The program management office (PMO) responsible for the daily administration of the program is under the PCU. The changes in the municipal administration resulted in the replacement of some PMO officers, which to a limited extent affected the PMO business process. As of 30 June 2017, the PMO is currently staffed with 15 officers.
- 41. Following an MUB's decision₈ the procurement activities have been transferred from PMO to the MUB Procurement Agency in December 2016. A procurement capacity assessment of this agency is scheduled to be conducted in early July 2017 and a memorandum of understanding has been prepared to specify the procurement-related task assignment and responsibilities between PMO and MUB Procurement Agency.

E. Procurement Plan

42. The original procurement plan consisting of 16 contract packages⁹ under ADB financing and two packages to be financed by the European Investment Bank (EIB). Originally all packages were to be procured through international competitive bidding (ICB). Further to (i) the increases in the Mongolia thresholds for ICB and national competitive

bidding (NCB)and (ii) adjustments to the detailed design of infrastructures and facilities, the procurement plan for the ADB-financed packages has been revised.

43. Based on the latest updated procurement plan₁₀ (**Appendix 4**) the construction of the infrastructure and facilities will be implemented through 25 procurement packages including 14 ADB-financed packages and 11 EIB-financed packages. The consulting services (CS) will be provided through six consulting firm contracts and two individual consultant (IC) contracts.₁₁ As of 30 June 2017, four CS contract are ongoing and one for improved operations and management of service providers and institutional and regulatory reform is yet to be awarded. To complement the provision of CS and meet the Program requirements it is envisaged to recruit one additional IC through single source selection to prepare the detailed design of the extension of the existing heating network.

1. ADB- financed Construction Packages

- 44. Of the 10 OCR-funded contract packages, seven are under bidding (five ICB and two NCB packages) with contract award expected in the third (Q3) and fourth (Q4) quarter of 2017; the detailed design and bidding documents for the remaining three packages are being finalized (**Appendix 5**).
- 45. Of the three **ADF-funded packages**, one is under NCB bidding with contract award expected in November 2017 (**Appendix 5**). Bidding documents are being finalized for the remaining two packages.

2. UEIF-Financed Package

46. The design, supply and installation of pump equipment, SCADA system, rehabilitation and commissioning of the pumping stations and water and waste water treatment plant is financed through the UEIF funds; the turnkey contract has been awarded to the JV of Comfort Impex" LLC and "Hunan Xiangnu Environmental Protection Industrial" Co.ltd for \$3.37 million on 13 October 2016; the detailed design by the contractor has been completed and works are about 40% complete. A contract variation entailing an additional contract price of about \$0.21 million has been approved upon ADB's endorsement; a contract addendum is being prepared.₁₂

3. EIB-financed Construction and Goods Packages

47. All 11 EIB-financed contact packages including ten construction packages and one good package will be procured through NCB. Three packages for the construction of sewerage collectors in Bayankhoshuu and Selbe sub centers have been awarded in March and July 2016 to the JV of Bumbod LLC and DWKB LLC, JV of Bumbod LLC and DWKB LLC and JV of Khurd LLC and Zest Khulug LLC for \$1.44 million, \$1.14 million and \$1.04 million respectively. Of the remaining seven construction packages for a total estimated cost of \$19.3 million, one is being tendered and bidding documents are being finalized for the other five; the contract awards are expected in Q3 and Q4 2017 (Appendix 5).

The updated procurement plan yet to be approved by ADB is attached to the memorandum of understanding (MOU) of the ADB mid-term review Mission of February 2017.

48. The EIB-financed goods package for the procurement of water supply and sewerage pipes for an estimated amount of \$1.83 million is under bidding; contract award is expected in early 2018.

4. Consulting Services Packages

- 49. The implementation of the Program Tranche 1 is supported by five team of consultants. All consulting services are being 100% financed from the ADB ADF Loan.
- 50. **CS1/CSDD Consulting services for detailed design and construction supervision.** The CS1 contract was signed on 29 May 2015 with the joint venture (JV) Dohwa Engineering Co. Ltd. (Korea) and Korea District Heating Corporation (Korea) in association with Monconsult LLC (Mongolia) in the amount of \$4,024,241.
- 51. The detailed design of the infrastructure and facility is not completed. Not all packages were approved by the State expertise, have their 'Summary report' from the Expertise, as well as the accompanying 'approved budget' from the Expertise. The detail design of the heating network is not complete. PMO received an email from CS1's TL about demobilization of their team in May 2017. The performance of the consultants is rated partly satisfactory on the low end of the scale. Delivery of detailed design has been significantly delayed even though partly due to reasons behind the control of the consultants. PMO is investigating options for dealing the contract with the Dohwa JV and recruiting another consulting firm to supervise the construction works.
- 52. As of 30 June 2017, a total of \$3,041,942.00 million including the advance payment has been disbursed.₁₃
- 53. **CS2/CSPM Program Management Support Services**. The CS2 contract was awarded to Egis International on 5 June 2014 for a total amount of \$1,237,727.69. Four contract variations have been processed, three cost neutral and variation No. 3 to increase the contract cost up to \$1,317,587.91 as the result of increase in consultants' inputs. A fifth cost neutral variation is being prepared to adjust the euro portion of the contract to the actual euro payment as 30 June 2017, increase the Team Leader input through a reduction of the Financial specialist input, and increase the equipment provisional sum after reducing the seminars and workshop provisional sum.
- 54. During the second quarter, 2017 CS2 activities focused on expediting and monitoring procurement of the program contract packages. In addition, several training sessions were conducted on bid opening, bid evaluation, archiving and personal skills. Workshops on land acquisition and involuntary resettlement as well as the ADB Safeguard Policy Statement were organized to the officers of the Land Management Office of MUB and two sub centers *khoroo* and *kheseg* leaders. Public consultations with the households located around the Selbe heating plant were organized. First drafts of the updated EMP and SAP and GAP were prepared.
- 55. **CS3/CSCE Community Engagement and Small and Medium Enterprise Development.** UN Habitat provides consulting services through a \$699,936 contract signed on 25 June 2015.
- 56. Communities Engagement and Development: UN-Habitat Team continued with facilitation meetings for reactivation of former primary groups (PG) as well as formation of new primary groups based on neighborhood agreements and decision in the sub center areas. Community mobilization and organization activities have been organized in selected

two blocks in each sub centers to facilitate primary group formation based on the block subdivision. The purpose of this work is to help the communities to start with block redevelopment planning. As result, three new primary groups in SBD 14th*khoroo*, four in CHD 18th*khoroo* and eight in SHD 8th*khoroo* are being formed.

- 57. Community Consultations for Redevelopment by Blocks: the CS3 team in cooperation with ADB Affordable Housing Project team organized 25 consultations in the sub centers (10 in Selbe and 15 in Bayankhoshuu). With the start of LARP implementation, the UN-Habitat Team has started providing legal support to the affected communities regarding land title and ownership issues. During the reporting period one poor household affected by the land acquisition for the planned kindergarten in Selbe received advice from the Legal Specialist.
- 58. Un-Habitat Team is preparing a project information boards with closed boxes for receiving comments. The boards will be placed in each of target khoroo offices nearest to the communities and help them to communicate with the project about their issues and constrains. The newly established subcenter development unit is preparing a regulation to handle the grievances received from the boxes under the guidance of CS3.
- 59. SME Engagement and Development: As per the PMO request, CS3 team has prepared a separate annex for reporting of implementation of SME Development Plan. Survey for review and assessment of needs of goods and services in order to match community needs and SME needs. UN-Habitat team has conducted a survey of Consumer Market Analysis and mapping of existing businesses and services in two sub-centers in March 2017. The survey covers over 3,200 people to understand the distinctiveness of the local market and its consumers. Compilation of the data and analysis was completed in June 2017.
- 60. Linking MSMEs to financial and training institutions: 65 micro business owners in Bayankhoshuu have been linked with SME Support Federation for SME support loan with lower interest. They have been trained by the Federation in business proposal development. They have developed their business proposals and submitted the proposals to get MSME support loan. The training for local businesses who wish to receive MSME loan was started on 23 June by the above Federation in Selbe area.
- 61. Contribution to CS4 in development of Sub center Local Development plans: CS3 team has been working with CS4 for the development of Sub center Local development plans. As part of CS3 inputs, the International SME Development Specialist has prepared projection of business development in the sub centers in 2017-2020.
- 62. IEC Activities: The UN-Habitat team provided assistance to the PMO to organize Project Introductory Meetings at Songinokhairkhan, Chingeltei and Sukhbaatar Districts Governors' Offices on 17, 18, 19 May 2017 respectively.
- 63. Two Facebook pages, for both sub centers are being regularly updated to disseminate information as well as in responding questions from the communities. There are 233 followers in Selbe and 125 followers in Bayankhoshuu as of June 2017.
- 64. In parallel, the UN-Habitat Team has been keeping interested parties (including affected residents from the sub-centers, residents from other areas of Ulaanbaatar City, interested companies and international and national NGOs) informed about the project, provided responses to their questions and clarifications through phone conversations and person-to-person meetings in the field and at its office, as needed.

- 65. During the block redevelopment consultations, 253 plot owners in Bayankhoshuu and 198 plot owners in Selbe were informed in person about the status of project implementation and ongoing parallel interventions of Affordable Housing and Urban Renewal Project (AHURP).
- 66. **CS4/CSSD Improved Urban Planning and Sub center Development.** The consulting services are being provided by IPE Global & Associates through a \$799,990 contract signed on 13 August 2015.
- 67. The work during Q2 2017 focused mainly on (i) the preparation of the local development plans (LDP) for Bayankhoshuu and Selbe sub centers; (ii) the development of a block planning manual and related tasks; and (iii) the assessment of training needs and the design of a training program in sub center redevelopment for key agencies of government. Some delays, however, were experienced in the work, particularly in relation to community liaison and feedback, on the account of the prohibition of contacting local communities during the period of the Presidential Election, and the difficulties in obtaining and agreeing on data for the LDPs from key agencies of the Municipality of Ulaanbaatar (MUB) and national government.
- 68. Reviewed and incorporated provisions of the Development Law of Mongolia. All action plans have been reviewed, and plan preparation is progressing according to these directions of these plans. The draft 4-year investment plan has been prepared in line with the government action plan 2016-2020 and, MUB and district action plans for both sub centers. These plans also have been prepared in compliance with the sector agencies' investment plans.
- 69. The Bayankhoshuu and Chingeltei, Khailaast and 9th Planned Unit Districts Master Plan where the two sub centers are located were approved by SRKh in June 2017. The plans are under review and are being compared with those of the Urban Development Institute (UDI) and the CS4's recommendations. The possibility of an official review by UDI has been discussed. An amendment to the master plan has been prepared with supporting maps. It was discussed with UDI on March 24and is to be processed for approval through by them. A cost and work proposal had been received. Due to the unfortunate circumstances unclear funding sources for the master plan amendment, further consultation could not finalize. Because of this, it has been proposed that the UDI plan will act as a phase one until 2025 and the CS4-prepared plan would be targeting 2040.
- CS4 have reviewed the laws related to urban redevelopment and recommendations have been made. They will be submitted to PMO by July 6. A redevelopment process for the sub centers has been prepared. It was suggested to develop sub centers based on three types of block development plans, four community incentive programs and five projects. Based on zoning requirements for low-density area the plan will be prepared through simple and complex readjustment planning approaches, while the higher density areas will be developed under the redevelopment planning principle. These three development plans will have five sectorial investment projects: (i) sub-center infrastructure project, (ii) housing project, (iii) public facility project, (iv) landscape projects, and (v) commercial amenity development project. Based on their location, the community will be supported by four programs: (i) block infrastructure program, (iii) housing program, (iii) business development program, and (iv) capacity building and strengthening of sub center development stakeholders. An initial meeting on the plans, and land readjustment and redevelopment mechanisms and community incentives has been held with City and District land authorities. This workshop was held at the PMO office on 21st of June.CS4 has reviewed and made suggestions to improve the Law on City and Settlement Redevelopment regarding block development. Regulations are still to be drafted and if there are pilot projects, lessons can be learnt from their implementation. The Law and its regulations can be improved further. It is intended that any new regulations be approved by the MUB Citizens Representative Khural.

- 71. Based on development parameters, the infrastructure assessment has been completed. Water supply and sewerage networks can with minor adjustments satisfy the proposed increase needs based on the population projections prepared by CS4. Heating network and supply, however, will have to increase to supply the increased load according to the revised population projections. CS4 has proposed that the network and capacity as designed the CS1 and UDI could be adopted until 2025. Beyond that date, an alternative solution may be needed but if development could be controlled by incorporating better-insulated structures, it could still satisfy the demand for heating until 2030.
- 72. CS4 has reviewed existing data with PMO and UN-Habitat.Revised target dates depends upon the completion of work by CS3/PMO. Because the base data for monitoring purposes was found to be lacking, it has been decided to update the data relating to the two sub centers. A contract variation was requested and approved by ADB on June 20 to hire the Database and GIS Specialist. Contracting is now on going. While waiting the approval of the variation, data collection templates have been prepared and *kheseg* leaders trained on data quality and entry on 17, 28 May, and 9 June 2017. Data collection activities are ongoing with 80% completion, and compiled according to the templates. But, because of the Presidential Election, engagement with the communities has been restricted.
- 73. City is currently preparing its housing and *ger* area development strategy. Consultation meetings with MUB Housing authority took place on 20 May 2017 with Mr. Enkhmanlai who is in charge of MUB housing and infrastructure program development. National Housing Strategy and MUB City Affordable Housing Strategy has been reviewed, including the land development process. The recommendation for city housing and *ger* area development strategy was submitted to the Capaital City Housing corporation.
- 74. A district and khoroo governments meetings have been undertaken on 15, 18 and 22 May 2017. A visioning workshop with *kheseg* leaders was held on 17 May 2017 for SKh District's 5 *khoroo's* 24 *kheseg* leaders; May 28th for Sukhbaatar district 14thkhoroo's 8 *kheseg* leaders; and June 9th for Chingeltei District 2 *khoroo's* 15 *kheseg* leaders. Consultation work shop for district officials and consultation discussions with land officers of District and City land authorities were conducted.
- 75. The small and medium entreprise (SME) policy for sub-center development is under preparation. CS4 is working with PMO/CS3 SME Specialist—supporting on data collection. Because of missing data, more time is required to complete the SME proposal. Data collection has been hindered by the Presidential Election, which has restricted any engagement with the communities.
- 76. Community willingness study has started but can only be finalized after the Presidential Election. Although the election process has been extended, all data collection will be finished after the election and the national Naadam celebrations. It is expecting to finalise survey and data collection in August. Database and GIS specialist approval by ADB was received only on 20 June 2017. Work on data collection has started but because of above, most will be undertaken in August.
- 77. The draft block development concepts, methods and tools were prepared and discussed with PMO, MUB Land Agency and ADB, but still require further discussions prior seeking official comments.
- 78. **CS5/CSOI Improved Operations and Management of Service Providers and Institutional and Regulatory Reform.** The consulting services to support utilities providers toward improved operations and management are yet to be contracted. PMO is preparing the request for proposal to be submitted to ADB along with the shortlist of consultants, which is finalized by the Bid Evaluation Committee.

F. Safeguard Components

1. Land Acquisition and Resettlement

- 79. Meeting the Tranche 1 requirements related to land acquisition and resettlement (LAR) requires the preparation and updating of five resettlement plans (RP):
 - (vi) RP1 –Selbe and Bayankhoshuu sub centers heating plant, kindergarten, business incubator and training center;
 - (vii) RP2 Bayankhoshuu sub center roads and infrastructures;
 - (viii) RP3 Selbe sub center roads and infrastructures.
 - (ix) RP4 KTMS-Tasgany Ovoo-Tavan Shar Water supply network; and
 - (x) RP5 Bayankhoshuu sub center water reservoir and pipes..
- 80. As the heating plant, kindergarten, business incubator and training center in Selbe and Bayankhoshuu sub centers were not anticipated in the original program scope, there is a need to develop a new RP for these facilities. The draft RP2 and RP3 have to be significantly revised and expanded due to the increased scope of roads and infrastructures in the final approved detailed design. The works envisaged under the RP4 and RP5 were not included in the original Tranche 1 scope, this RPs have to be developed in full.
- 81. In addition to the RPs two due diligence reports would be required one for Selbe/Dambadarjaa water reservoir and pipes and the other for Bayankhoshuu heating pipes and facilities for replacing existing pipes with new ones with more capacity.
- 82. Based on preliminary figures the number of affected households (AHH) is significantly higher than anticipated at Appraisal. This is mainly due to the change in the road layout, widening of the project roads and the laying of pipes outside the right of way of the existing roads. As of 30 June 2017, the anticipated number of AHHs is summarized in Table 1.

83. The **RP1** consists of three sections: A. General Provisions, B. Selbe Sub center and C. Bayankhoshuu Sub center. Section A. has been completed and sent to ADB for review on 2 June. Section B. and C. are being finalized and expected to be completed in the end of July 2017. The RP1 delayed completion is due to late submission of the final design, which was required to review and confirm the census, socio-economic surveys and valuation works carried in 2016.

- 84. The **RP2** and **RP3** are expected to be completed by the end of September 2017. The preparation of these RPs was delayed due to late submission of the final detailed design. To date the list of AHHs and the terms of reference for the census, socio-economic surveys and valuation of land/properties have been completed. Public consultations (nine meetings in Selbe and eight in Bayankhoshuu) have been held. The socio-economic surveys are expected to be completed by mid of July and the valuation works are to be completed in early August 2017.
- 85. The preparatory works for **RP4 and RP5** are ongoing. The list of AHHs is being prepared based on the final detailed design of the piping works and water reservoir, which were made available to the LARP team in May 2017.
- 86. Upon submission of the final detailed design of the piping and water reservoir works in Selbe and Dambadarjaa, PMO engineers and LARP team conducted joint field visits to confirm that a full RP is not required. A due diligence report is being prepared and expected to be completed in the end of July 2017.
- 87. As a result of the site visits conducted in Bayankhoshuu sub center to assess the LARP impacts it is anticipated that the heating piping works and facilities would not require any acquisition of private land. Upon confirmation of this preliminary finding, after the final technical design is completed₁₄, a due diligence report will be prepared and expected to be completed by the end of August 2017. This work is pending the approval of the technical design by MUB.
- 88. The overall cost of the LAR is tentatively estimated at about \$23.54 million well above the Appraisal estimate of \$1.02 million. More accurate figures will be determined once the negotiations with the affected households are completed, agreements reached, and RPs finalized.

2. Environmental Management Plan

89. As a main task of the CS2 in terms of environmental safeguard issue in Q2 of 2017 the environmental consultant focused on finalization of update of the environmental assessment and review framework (EARF) and the environmental management plan (EMP)

have been finalized according to ADB requirements. The updated EARF and EMP have been posted on the ADB website.

- 90. Terms of reference and a cost estimate have been prepared to recruit a consultant to update the EMP. The recruitment process by the Ulaanbaatar Municipality is ongoing; the consultant is expected to mobilize in the Q4 2017. PMO delivered related documents to the Ministry of Environment and Tourism (MET) for the general environmental impact assessment (GEIA) covering the entire program. The updated GEIA has been released. The detailed environmental and impact assessment (DEIA) for Tranche 2 is being reviewed by MET.
- 91. A public consultation was conducted to inform likely affected households of the potential environmental impacts of the 25.2 mWt heating station. About 80 people from the 13th and 14th khoroos of Sukhbaatar district and 14th khoroo of Chingeltei district attended the consultation meeting and completed the survey questionnaire.
- 92. The second Environmental Monitoring report covering the June 2016-June 2017 period was prepared and expected to submit to ADB by mid July 2017. The report referred more in detail on the occupational safeguard issues related to the sewage collector line subproject in Selbe and Bayankhoshuu subcenters.

3. Social and Gender Development Plans

- 93. The CS2 assisted to PMO for preparation of the mid-term review report on Social, Gender and Community Participation for overall project-1 in collaboration with UN-Habitat for period of July 2015-February 2017. According to ADB gender specialist comments, GAP and SAP implementation progress report was finalized and submitted to ADB mission. During the ADB MTR Mission, targets and indicators for monitoring SAP and GAP were reviewed and updated.
- 94. A database has been developed at macro and micro level for the two sub-centers based on the existing secondary data by sex disaggregated. The consultants updated the database to incorporate secondary data from the National Statistics Office and Department of Ulaanbaatar Statistics.
- 95. The CS2 gender/social specialist assisted the UN Habitat consultants to analyze the information collected during the consultation meetings for monitoring the social action plan, gender action plan and CAP. Sex disaggregated data were reported in the quarterly and semi-annual project implementation reports. A database for all consultation meetings and trainings including sex-disaggregated data has been established, updated and shared with ADB. To date, 121 community consultations and training sessions were conducted and attended by 3,137 persons, of whom 55.7% were women.
- 96. The social and gender development specialist conducted workshop on ADB and Mongolian Government's Safeguard Policies and Principles with regards to Social Safeguards for stakeholders from government officers of Songinokhairkhan, Chingeltei and Sukhbaatar districts.

G. Project Cost

97. At Appraisal, the Tranche 1 was estimated \$104.52 million. Based on the actual price of the awarded contracts and updated cost estimate of the to-be-awarded contracts the total project cost has been updated at \$106.14 million, 1.6% above the appraisal estimate. The cost increase mainly resulted from higher than estimated land acquisition costs.

H. Project Financing

98. The Tranche 1 is financed through three sources: the ADB, EIB and the Municipality of Ulaanbaatar. The ADB's funds are provided through a loan from the Asian Development Fund (ADF, SDR14,54 million), a loan from the ordinary capital resources (OCR, \$27.50 million) and a grant from the Urban Environmental Infrastructure Fund (UEIF, 3.70 million). The Tranche 1 financing plan is detailed in Table 4. As of end of June 2017, the updated financing reveals the following changes: (i) the ADB ADF Loan amount in dollars terms is reduced from \$22.50 million at Appraisal to about \$20.50 million due to the depreciation of

the US dollar against the special drawing rights (SDR); (ii) as the result of the increased land acquisition cost the contribution of the MUB significantly increase from \$22.44 million at Appraisal to \$32.43 million by the end of June 2017; and (iii) the less than anticipated costs of the water supply and sewerage works reduced the EIB financing share.

I. Disbursements

99. The status of disbursement as of 30 June 2017 is summarized in Table 5. All ADB loans and grant combined the total disbursement stood at about \$7.44 million, mainly for consulting services under the ADF Loan; the current ADB and EIB low disbursement ratio (14.38% and 9.49% respectively) are likely to pick up with the signing of several civil works contracts in the last quarter 2017.

J. Loan Covenants – Framework Financing Agreement

100. Most of the loan covenants due by end of June 2017 have been complied with. The 2016 audited financial statement were submitted to ADB on 31 June 2017. No significant deviance from road map and policy framework has been recorded. Compliance with loan covenants is detailed in **Appendix 6**.

K. Conclusions, Issues and Recommendations

- 101. With a completion rate of about 18.86% (26.61) and an overall disbursement ratio of about 14.47% the implementation of Tranche 1 is behind schedule. The anticipated target date for completion by mid 2018 is unlikely to be met. The finalization of the LARPs and the delayed and lengthy procurement processes significantly contribute to the implementation delay.
- 102. While the decision to have the procurement activities handled by the MUB Procurement Agency acting as an independent procurement agent is in line with good governance principles, the need to have the evaluation and recommendations for contract award reviewed by PMO prior to seeking ADB concurrence on the bid evaluation report delays the process. In many instances during the quarter under review, the evaluation of bids was to be reconsidered at the request of the PMO Procurement Committee. Furthermore, the MUB Procurement Agency also dealing with other MUB procurement activities may not have sufficient resources to handle the large number of Tranche 1 contract packages which are to be awarded in the next six months. The same apply to PMO procurement unit while reviewing and amending the bid evaluation reports and eventually incorporating the ADB's comments.
- 103. As a prerequisite to the start-up of the civil works five LARPs have to be finalized and implemented. Of these five LARPs, three have to be fully developed and two significantly revised to reflect increases in land acquisition as a result of significant design changes. While the LARP preparation is well advanced, there is a risk for their implementation to be delayed: (i) negotiations with the affected people may take lon*ger* than anticipated and (ii) due to the significant increase in the land acquisition costs there is a risk of shortage of MUB funds to acquire the land required before the 2018 construction season.
- 104. To address the procurement issue there would be a need to reinforce the staff resources of both the MUB Procurement Agency and PMO. Also the CS2 procurement consultants should strengthen their support to PMO and maintain close relation with ADB to anticipate the issues and take remedial actions. While capacity is not an issue, there is still a need for CS2 to provide training through training sessions and on-the-job guidance.
- 105. Concurrently with expediting the procurement activities there is a need to finalize the five LARPs and expedite their implementation including negotiations with the affected land and property. There is a need to closely monitor land acquisition cost given the MUB financial constraints.
- 106. Also, the Tranche 1 investment costs have to be closely monitored. Upon signing contract under ADB OCR financing it will be necessary to breakdown the contract price to identify costs pertaining to heat distribution networks from the other cost items. This exercise is required since the financing percentage are different for these two categories, 55.00% and 69.60% of the total expenditure claimed for the heat distribution networks and other works respectively.15

APPENDIX 4 UPDATED PROCUREMENT PLAN

JUSTIFICATION TO REVISE THE PROCUREMENT PLAN OF "ULAANBAATAR URBAN SERVICES AND GER AREAS DEVELOPMENT INVESTMENT PROGRAM" TRANCHE-1

The Framework Financing Agreement (FFA) established between Mongolia and Asian Development Bank (ADB) on December 2013 and it was duly approved by the Parliament. The Ulaanbaatar Urban Services and Ger Areas Development Investment Program: Tranche 1 was commenced in 2014.

Under the Tranche 1 of the Project, the Procurement of Consultancy Service for Detailed Engineering Design, Tendering and Construction Supervision Service was carried out in 2014, contract was awarded to "Dohwa Engineering" Co, Ltd, and the was signed on 06 April 2015.

In accordance with the Contract Agreement, the Detailed Engineering Design was planned to finish by July 2015. However, as of 18 November 2016, the Detailed Engineering Design and as well as tendering documents was not completed as planned due to resettlement issues, low quality of design works and unsatisfactory performance of the Consultancy Service and it leads to work delay for an another year. The financial capability of construction companies in Mongolia is limited further aggravated by the current economic conditions in Mongolia. The Project is in urgent need of re-organizing the works and plants, taking into consideration the closing date of Tranche 1, which is 30 June 2018, and the circumstances mentioned above and in the PP.

Further, the PMO wishes to spread the procurement risk by:

Preparing smaller packages and awarding more contracts. This will encourage more contractors and smaller contracts will increase the visibility and public relation that the MUB proposes. Contractors are prone to making frequent complaints, if there are any disputes during tendering process; the work cannot be started as planned. Having more packages also reduces this risk.

Financial resource requirements in the bidding documents are usually high contractors and in particular for Kindergarten and Vocational Training Center for Selbe and Bayankhoshuu Sub-centers. Therefore, it is proposed to divide this one contract package into two lots. The project implementation period is limited, dividing the contract into 2 separate packages: Kindergarten and Vocational Training Center is beneficial to finish the construction work in shorter period. There is little effect to supervision towards the Construction of Kindergarten and Vocational Training Center Building whether it is one package or two separate packages.

Thus, there is a necessity to revise the contract packages of Procurement Plan and these changes are as proposed in the attached revised PP.

E. National Competitive Bidding

A. Regulation and Reference Documents

1. The procedures to be followed for national competitive bidding shall be those set forth in the Public Procurement Law of Mongolia of 1 December 2005, effective 1 February 2006, as amended in February 2007; July 2009; and February, June and December 2011 (hereinafter referred to as PPLM), with the clarifications and modifications described in the following paragraphs required for compliance with the provisions of the ADB Procurement Guidelines.

B. Procurement Procedures

Eligibility [Recommended standard provision]

Government-owned enterprises in Mongolia shall be eligible for projects only if they can establish
that they: (i) are legally and financially autonomous; (ii) operate under the principles of commercial law;
and (iii) are not dependent agencies of the Borrower, Beneficiary, Recipient Executing Agency and/or
the Implementing Agency.

2. Participation of Foreign Bidders

 International bidders from eligible countries of ADB shall be allowed to participate in local procurement and may not be denied participation due to nationality.

3. Preferences

No domestic preference shall be given for domestic bidders and for domestically manufactured goods.

4. Prequalification and Registration

6. Prequalification is discouraged for procurement contracts using NCB. When used, particularly for works contracts, an individual prequalification exercise is acceptable for each contract as is the use of a registration system (or approved standing list) of contractors based on criteria such as experience, financial capacity, and technical capacity. Foreign bidders from eligible countries must, however, be allowed to register and to bid without unreasonable cost or additional requirements.

5. Rejection of All Bids and Rebidding

- All bids shall not be rejected or new bids invited without ADB's prior written concurrence.
- No bid shall be rejected merely based on a comparison with the estimated cost or budget ceiling without

ADB's prior written concurrence (with specific reference to Article 30 of the PPLM).

C. Bidding Documents

6. Use of Bidding Documents

 National Standard Bidding Documents Goods and Works that have been approved for procurement in ADB-financed projects shall be used.

7. Language

 Bidding documents may be prepared in other languages, but a copy of the bidding documents must be made available in English and submitted to ADB for review.

8. Bid Validity

11. Bidders shall be requested to extend the validity of their bids only under exceptional circumstances and the Executing or Implementing Agency, as the case may be, shall communicate such request for extension to all bidders before the date of expiry of their bids. When the procurement is subject to ADB's prior review, the Executing or Implementing Agency, as the case may be, shall obtain in a timely manner the prior written concurrence of ADB for the extension of the bid validity period.

9. Bid Evaluation

- 12. Evaluation and qualification criteria, and submission requirements, to be used in each bidding activity shall be clearly specified in the bidding documents. The evaluation of bids shall be done in strict adherence to the criteria specified in the bidding documents.
- 13. Negotiations with bidders shall not be undertaken before award of contract, except as provided in Paragraph 2.63 of ADB's Procurement Guidelines a bidder shall not be required, as a condition for award, to undertake obligations not specified in the bidding documents or otherwise to modify its bid as originally submitted.
- 14. At the same time that notification on award of contract is given to the successful bidder, the results of the bid evaluation shall be posted on a well-known freely accessible website (namely Mongolia's Ministry of Finance

e-procurement website: www.e-procurement.mn) identifying the bid and lot numbers and providing information on the: (i) name of each bidder that submitted a bid; (ii) bid prices as read out at bid opening; (iii) names of bidders whose bids were rejected and the reasons for their rejection; and (iv) name of the winning bidder, and the price it offered, as well as the duration and summary scope of the contract awarded. The Executing Agency or Implementing Agency, as the case may be, shall respond in writing to unsuccessful bidders who seek explanations on the grounds on which their bids were not selected.

10. ADB Policy Clauses

- 15. A provision shall be included in all NCB works and goods contracts financed by ADB requiring suppliers and contractors to permit ADB to inspect their accounts and records and other documents relating to the bid submission and the performance of the contract, and to have them audited by auditors appointed by ADB.
- 16. A provision shall be included in all bidding documents for NCB works and goods contracts financed by ADB stating that the Borrower shall reject a proposal for award if it determines that the bidder recommended for award has, directly or through an agent, engaged in corrupt, fraudulent, collusive, coercive or obstructive practices in competing for the contract in question.
- 17. A provision shall be included in all bidding documents for NCB works and goods contracts financed by ADB stating that ADB will declare a firm or individual ineligible, either indefinitely or for a stated period, to be awarded a contract financed by ADB, if it at any time determines that the firm or individual has, directly or through an agent, engaged in corrupt, fraudulent, collusive, coercive or obstructive practices or any integrity violation in competing for, or in executing, ADB-financed contract.
